





"Bold and courageous" litigation strategy

- Human rights
- Intergenerational implications
- Non-discrimination
- Extraterritoriality & jurisdiction
- Non-exhaustion of domestic remedies
- Temporality and urgency
- Participation, access to justice and ethics
- Potential impacts: paradigm shift?

Disappointment or...?

- 1. Inadmissibility: non-exhaustion of domestic remedies
- 2. The dismissal of extraterritoriality
 - <-> IACtHR (AO 2017): States must prevent the production of environmental harm extraterritorially, provided the source of that harm lies on their territory (bridging the gap between source and victim)
 - <-> CRC Committee (Sacchi et al. case)
- **3. Discrimination and victim status:** "difficult" to justify (vulnerability of children as a generational group)
- 4. Intergenerational considerations
- Not adjudicated in Duarte Agostinho...
- <-> KlimaSenniorinnen:
 - A "springboard"? (indirect considerations taken from the Duarte case?)
 - Impact on children's rights?

Other children's rights considerations

Strategic climate litigation and moral elements

Including the marginalised and the 'voiceless': building on non-discrimination.

Recognising children as agents (of change): 'action is better than non-action'

Framing time: 'now, future, emergency, throughout their lifetime...'

Children and future generations

- Complexity and confusion

Social change: intergenerational justice is as a moral imperative.
